INTRODUCTION

NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF HOMOEOPATHY was established on 10th December 1975 in Kolkata, as an autonomous organisation under the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India, presently under the Ministry of AYUSH, Govt. of India. The Institute was affiliated to the University of Calcutta up to session 2003-04 and from 2004-05 has been affiliated to the West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata. This Institute, conducts the degree course in Homoeopathy i.e., Bachelor of Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery [B.H.M.S.] since 1987 and Post - Graduate course i.e. Doctor of Medicine in Homoeopathy [M.D. (Hom.)] since 1998. At present PG course is offered in six subjects viz. Organon of Medicine, Materia Medica, Repertory, Homoeopathic Pharmacy, Practice of Medicine and Paediatrics.

The Institute is functioning in its own campus measuring about 16 acres of land at Block-GE, Sector - III, Salt Lake City, Kolkata - 700 106, from August 1986 onwards. The Institute has an Academic building/Administrative block, Hospital (IPD/OPD) and Under Graduate Hostels for boys and girls. Construction of the Phase-1 of the 8-storied Academic-cum-Library building situated in the main campus at block GE is about to be completed. The 1st Phase (G+3 floors) of the new Academic-cum-Library building with all modern amenities is completed and has been operational; 7 departments classes are shifted to new Building, the 2nd phase of construction is near completion. The extension of hospital building (G+3) is near completion for extension of hospital bed strength from existing 100 to 250 beds. There are two other campuses, one measuring about 10 acres located in Block-JC, Salt Lake, Kolkata, where Residential Quarters for the staff of the Institute, International Hostel and Post Graduate Hostel are situated. Another campus measuring about 25 acres having a herbal plant garden and a peripheral OPD is located in Kalyani, Dist. Nadia, West Bengal, about 50 kms away from the main campus. Govt. of India has declared the National Institute of Homoeopathy, as the Center for Traditional Medicine in South East Asian Region Countries under Delhi Declaration.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES OF THE INSTITUTE

- To promote the growth and development of Homoeopathy;
- To produce graduates and postgraduates in Homoeopathy;
- To conduct research on various aspects of Homoeopathy;
- To provide medical care through Homoeopathy to the suffering humanity;
- To provide and assist in providing services and facilities for research, evaluation, training, consultation, and guidance related to Homoeopathy;
- To conduct experiments and develop patterns of teaching in undergraduate and postgraduate education on various aspects of Homoeopathy.

MANAGEMENT

The Governing Body is the apex body of the Institute. The Governing body appoints a Standing Finance Committee, which scrutinizes the proposal of the Institute involving the financial matters. There is a secretariat setup in the department of AYUSH to render effective administrative support to the Governing Body and SFC in managing the affairs of the Institute. The Director is the Chief Executive of the Institute.

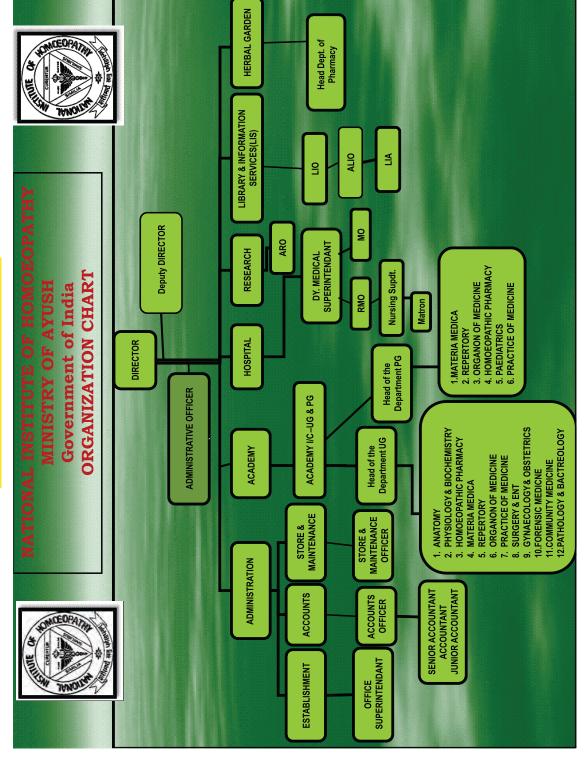

2. ACADEMIC ACTIVITIES

The Institute is recognized by the Central Council of Homoeopathy, to conduct B.H.M.S. course in Homoeopathy viz., Bachelor of Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery; and from 1998-99 to conduct MD (Homoeopathy) courses. It was formerly affiliated to the University of Calcutta and from 16th Batch (Session 2004-05) onwards, the Institute is affiliated to the West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata. Number of UG & PG got admitted during the period 82(UG) and 32(PG) respectively.

2.1 UNDER GRADUATE COURSE

(Bachelor of Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery)

The BHMS course is of 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ years duration (including one year compulsory internship) and was started in December 1987. Students possessing Higher Secondary (10+2) or Equivalent qualification with at least five subjects including English, Physics, Chemistry and Biology are eligible for admission. Presently the 26th batch is in roll.

For the academic session 2015-16, 93 seats were available for admission to the BHMS Course, out of which **14 (fourteen)** seats are allocated amongst the nominees of States/Union Territories (Table below); **05 (five)** seats are reserved for students of bay of Bengal Initiative for Multi Sectoral Technical Co-operation (BIMSTEC) countries nominated by Indian Council for Cultural Relations, Ministry of External Affairs, Azad Bhavan, Indraprastha Estate, New Delhi; **01(one)** seat is reserved for Foreign National under self-financing scheme and **10 (ten)** seats are to be filled up by candidates are sponsored by Govt. of Sri Lanka, these seats will remain vacant; no other candidate will be admitted against these seats.

The State/UTs will send the nomination of candidates directly to the Director of the Institute within the prescribed date every year. The candidates nominated against the above quota should not be blind (including colour blindness), deaf and/or dumb and should possess at least 50% marks

(45% for SC & ST candidates) under the **10+2** science stream with at least five subjects including English, Physics, Chemistry and Biology. The unutilized seats from the above quota may be filled from the merit list of Admission Test subject to approval of the Ministry.

The selection for the remaining 63 (Sixty Three) seats will be made on the basis of an All India Written Competitive Test (Admission Test) held at Kolkata, New Delhi, Mumbai, Hyderabad, Chennai, Bhopal and Thiruvanthapuram centres.

The reservation in admission will be provided as applicable under the reservation rule of Government of India.

This year NIH conducted the entrance examination for BHMS course at Kolkata, Chennai, Mumbai, Delhi, Thiruvananthapuram, Hyderabad and Bhopal Center on 14.06.2015.

2.2 POST GRADUATE COURSE

[M.D. (Homoeopathy)]

These MD (Hom) course is available on Six subjects viz. Organon of Medicine, Materia Medica, Repertory, Homoeopathic Pharmacy, Practice of Medicine and Paediatrics. Currently the 16th batch has already been enrolled through All India Entrance Examination conducted by West Bengal University of Health Sciences. The courses are as per the curriculum prescribed by the Central Council of Homoeopathy.

Subject wise distribution of seats in MD (Hom) course

Out of total 36 students, 2 seats are reserved for sponsored candidates of BIMSTEC countries, joining through Indian Council for Cultural Relation (ICCR). Reservations to remaining 34 seats are applicable as per GOI norms. From the Academic Session 2014-2015 Six seats are earmarked for Central Government Nominees.

At present 14th Batch of PGTs have completed their course curriculum and shall be appearing M.D. (Hom.) Part – II Examination. 15th Batch PGTs are preparing their dissertation work. Examination. 16th Batch PGTs preparing to appear M.D. (Homoeopathy) Part – I Annual Examination 2015. 17th Batch PGTS are about to submit their research proposals (synopsis).

3. DEPARTMENTAL ACTIVITIES

There are thirteen Academic Departments apart from the Library & Information Services Division.

3.1 DEPARTMENT OF ANATOMY

The renovation and extension work of the department of Anatomy is over and the office is been shifted.

Sufficient numbers of charts, models, bone sets, skeletons, mounted specimens (viscera's, dissected regions and parts) are available to conduct both lectures as well as demonstration classes for the students. Sufficient numbers of dead bodies (dissected and un-dissected) are preserved in the department. A good number of Histological slides, projection slides, over head project sheets, 3D charts, laminated pictures, CD's, CPR's are available in the department.

Teaching aids like LCD, LCD Monitor, Laptop & Desktop, Over Head Projector, 35 mm slide Projector, Handy cam, Camera, sufficient number of Microscopes, etc are available in the department. Adequate numbers of text as well as reference books on Anatomy and on other subjects required for day- to -day teaching program are also available in the department. Interactive Pen-Drive is used in conducting lecture & demonstration classes.

One full time Professor & one Lecturer, one part time Lecturer, two full time Group-D staff and one part time Group-D staff are available in the department.

Besides taking classes for the undergraduate and postgraduate students, the faculty members of the department also deliver lectures periodically at Re-Orientation Training programme in the subject Anatomy as well as at MCH and CME programme as Resource Persons / Experts. The faculty members are also guiding the Internees for preparation of their Project work and Case Recording as well as attending Seminars and Symposia regularly.

3.2 PHYSIOLOGY & BIO-CHEMISTRY

The Department is located on the 3rd floor of the Academic wing. It has one Physiology Practical class room, one Biochemistry Practical class room; one room for Professor, one room for Reader and one room for Lecturer and one room is being used as store. The well-equipped laboratory has been newly renovated to accommodate 50 students at a time to cater the need of increasing number of students at UG level from 2009-10. The departmental library has adequate collection of books required for day-to-day teaching as well as reference work.

The department displayed the **40 nos.** of different display charts, and is having different CDs and animation software's and pdf format of many books for the academic interest of the students, teachers and visitors, which will give the good impression on their mind.

The Department is staffed with one Reader, one Lecturer and supported by one Laboratory Attendant.

Regular and intensive theory and practical classes for First year and Second year students are held. Regular inter-active tutorials also help to enrich the students' knowledge. All the classes, both theory and practical are guided by the C.C.H. regulation and in accordance with the curriculum prescribed by the University.

The syllabus of the Physiology and biochemistry are made into PowerPoint presentation for the students to understand the subject well.

The faculty members are attending OPD on regular basis and admitting patients in the IPD as well as sharing a number of additional responsibilities. The faculty members also guiding the internees for preparation of their Project work and Case Recording.

3.3 ORGANON OF MEDICINE & CHRONIC DISEASES, HOMOEOPATHIC PHILOSOPHY & PSYCHOLOGY

B.H.M.S. classes and M.D. (Hom.) activities were held as per norms of CCH and The West Bengal University of Health Sciences.

In the Post Graduate section there were four batches of students (15^{th} batch -8; 16^{th} batch -8; 16^{th} batch -8; 17^{th} batch -9 and two from 12^{th} batch rejoined = 27 (Total)). They were undergoing training on clinical classes, group discussion, seminars, tutorial classes, case presentation and journal club, etc.

The department also participate in general seminar, workshop regularly.

An e-library was inaugurated on 28th October 2015 by HOD which has **different Seminars**, **lectures by different Stalwarts**, **e-books**, **and e-Journals**,**etc**. The existing Museum and Archive of History of Medicine was updated.

3.4 MATERIA MEDICA & HOMOEOPATHIC THERAPEUTICS

The department conducts Theoretical, Clinical and Tutorial classes both in Undergraduate and Post Graduate level. The department participates in weekly seminars, clinical and group discussions, workshops organized in the Institution.15th Batch PGTs have successfully completed their M.D.(Hom.) examination. All nine seats are filled in Materia Medica Department of 17th batch PGTs. The students are taught to be self-reliance under the constant guidance of teachers.

The department organized different lecture programmes, discussions & seminars in which the PG students and the faculty members participated and had discussions.

3.5 CASE TAKING AND REPERTORISATION

The subject of Repertory is taught to both Post Graduate and Undergraduate level. In the under graduate level the subject is being taught in the 4^{th} B.H.M.S. There are nine seats available for P.G., in Repertory. Presently 23^{rd} batch Undergraduate and 15^{th} , 16^{th} and 17^{th} batch Post graduate students are pursuing their study in the subject.

The teaching of the subject aims at providing thorough knowledge in case taking; analysis of different aspect of the case and utility of various repertories in different types of cases.

Regular seminars and group discussions are carried out in the department for PGTs.

Repertory Department is having Repertory Software for analysis and synthesis of the cases. Modern electronic gadgets are available in the department for smooth teaching. The departmental library caters to the daily needs of the students and teachers.

Practical/Clinical aspect of the subject is being taught through the OPD and IPD of the attached Hospital of the Institute.

Faculty of the department includes two regular Lecturers and four Readers on contractual basis. The department has been accommodated in the newly constructed Academy-cum-Library Building.

3.6 HOMOEOPATHIC PHARMACY

The department imparts teaching to both UG as well as PG students. They are exposed to different methods of preparing homoeopathic medicines and the method of their standardization as per

the standard Pharmacopoeia. Apart from theoretical and practical training in the subject of Pharmacy periodical assessment tests and tutorials are conducted to equip the students for their 1st BHMS examination under the West Bengal University of Health Sciences.

The well-equipped laboratory can accommodate 50 students at a time to cater the need of increased number of students at UG level .The laboratory is well decorated with modern pharmaceutical equipment's & apparatuses like distillation plant, hot air oven, water bath, microscope, infrared moisture balance apart from other common instruments. The laboratory also contains 51 herbarium sheets in wooden frame, 146 herb specimen (dry), 36 herb specimens (preserved in FAA solution), 10 mineral specimens and 9 animal specimens and 10 botanical slides.

Department is also having 30 nos. of charts on Pharmacy & also enough chemicals for conducting practical classes. Departmental Library has books in the subjects like BHP, and HPI along with other reference books on medicinal plants and CD's on pharmacy.

The department has a small medicinal plants garden in the institute campus. The students of 26th batch was taken to "Dr.Wilmar Schewabe Manufacturing unit at Noida (UP) and CCRH Unit ,New Shimla on 04.12.2015 and 03.12.2015 respectively.

The department conducts PG course in Homoeopathic Pharmacy i.e., M.D.(Hom.) with three admissions each academic year. There is a separate air conditioned Post Graduate Laboratory where the PG trainees can do their dissertation/research work and practical. This lab has Electric Potentiser, Electric Triturator, Spectroscope, TLC apparatus, Colorimetry apparatus, digital balance, digital pH meter along with glass wares and chemicals. Currently there are four Post Graduate batches in roll. Three in 2013-16 (15th batch), two in 2014-17 (16th batch), and three PG students got themselves admitted in session 2015-18(17th batch). Two PG students of 12th batch (session 2010-13) rejoined the PG Pharmacy course to complete their study. The 14th batch final Part II exam already held in January 2016. They all passed.

3.7 DEPARTMENT OF PRACTICE OF MEDICINE & PAEDIATRICS

The Department is an integrated unit for both undergraduate and postgraduate courses of the affiliating university in the speciality of Practice of Medicine.

This Department has functioned with four full-time faculty members – one Professor, one Reader and two Lecturers. There are two senior specialist physicians who are attached as Guest Faculty, for assistance in teaching/training of undergraduate/postgraduate students and in ensuring better management of hospital patients.

The Department has been functioning from its new location in the first floor of the New Academic cum Library Building from March 2014.

The intake capacity for MD (Hom) in the subject is three. The first batch (admitted 2009-10), second batch (admitted 2010-11), third batch (admitted 2011-12) and fourth batch (admitted 2012-13) have passed out (Total 11 PG students). The fifth, sixth and seventh batches are pursuing their Course.

As in the previous year, the postgraduate students under guidance of faculty members have published several scientific papers in well-known Homoeopathic Journals/Periodicals.

3.8 SURGERY:

Activities of the Department:

Theory and practical classes held for the 3^{rd} and 4^{th} year students as per schedule in IPD, OPD, and Class rooms, students and interns are being acquainted with the basic concepts and techniques in Surgical diseases in the OPD and the IPD.

Students and Interns are being trained in the basics of General Surgery, Orthopaedic Surgery, Eye, ENT and Dental surgery.

Students and interns are being trained in the basics of first aid to a victim/patient in collaboration with St. John Ambulance Association West Bengal.

Oncologist holds special clinic every week for training students and helping the doctors of the Institute involved in cancer related research work.

3.9 OBSTETRICS AND GYNAECOLOGY

The Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology is involved in teaching of 2nd and 3rd B.H.M.S. students. The department has one full-time lecturer and one guest faculty.

There are 6 charts, 14 specimens, 67 instruments, 3 dummy fetus, 2 fetal skulls, 6 contraceptives available in the department. Classes of 2nd and 3rd B.H.M.S are conducted as per the norms of C.C.H. and West Bengal University of Health Sciences. Besides the everyday teaching activities the Department also participates in the weekly seminars. There is also one computer with all its accessories in the department which helps to prepare the study materials for audio-visual teaching. Students are being given practical training in the O.P.D., I.P.D. and in Operation Theatre. The subject is being taught by making proper integration of knowledge of the subject proper with the knowledge of Homoeopathy. Interns are being guided to carry-out their dissertation work under the guidance of departmental head. P.G.T.s, who have their dissertation on gynecological topics, are being trained and helped to carry out their work. Internal assessments are also being conducted for the students.

3.10 DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY MEDICINE

The Department of Community Medicine is involved in teaching of 4th BHMS students as well as research methodology and bio-statistics for PG students. The Department has one museum (for practical demonstration), where different instruments, models and charts related to different subject matters of PSM (e.g. family planning, nutrition, immunization, medical entomology, public health, etc.) is preserved for practical classes. All the classes, both theory and practical, are guided by the CCH regulation and in accordance with the curriculum prescribed by the University.

The students visit different places of public health importance as part of their field visits in accordance with the prescribed university curriculum. The final year students were taken to Indira Gandhi Water Treatment Plant, Palta, Barakpore, on 15.6.2015 & 16.6.2015 in two batches, where they were exposed on how the water from the river Hooghly is purified and safe drinking water is supplied to the whole city of Kolkata. Second field was to Mother Diary Calcutta, in two groups on 17.06.2015 and 18.06.2015. Where the students are exposed to methods of pasteurizations of milk and production of different milk products.

The third field visit was to National Institute of Cholera and Enteric Diseases on 22.06.2015, where the students were exposed to the recent developments in the field of research activities, fundamental, clinical and animal experimentation related to cholera and other enteric diseases, and also related to HIV and AIDS . They were also exposed to the state of art facility available for research at different divisions of NICED. The fourth field visit was on 23.06.2015 to the Urban Health Centre, Chetla, field practice unit of

All India Institute of Public Health & Hygiene, where the students had a practical experience of how a PHC functions.

Every year from 10th January to 16th January the Homoeopathic Camp at Gangasagar Mela is being organized by this Dept. with the help from Hospital Section.

The Interns, 21st & 22nd batch, were sent to ID Hospital as well as to Bidhannagar Sub-divisional Hospital for two weeks training in management of infectious diseases and for exposure to various National Health Programmes that were being carried out through Primary health centre respectively on monthly rotation basis.

3.11 FORENSIC MEDICINE & TOXICOLOGY

The Dept. of Forensic Medicine and Toxicology is headed by a full-time Professor assisted by a full time Reader. Regular theoretical, practical and tutorial classes for 2^{nd} BHMS students are taken by the faculties. The teachers of the department are also involved in patient care and training of interns as well as PGTs' in the hospital OPD and IPD.

At present in the current batch 54 students are attending classes. In the previous batch 83 students appeared for university examination last year, out of which 78 students passed the university examination successfully and the unsuccessful students will be appearing with the current batch of students. Undergraduate students of 2nd BHMS course are imparted with up- to-date knowledge in Forensic Medicine and Toxicology in compliance with the CCH guidelines. Like previous years, students were taken to R.G.Kar Medical College and Hospital Morgue, Kolkata for demonstration of medicolegal autopsies [postmortems]. They had to appear for theoretical, practical and oral class assessment examinations which had immensely helped them to groom themselves for the university examinations.

The well-equipped Museum-cum-demonstration room of the department can accommodate 35 students at a time and has 30 wax models, 04 sets of dried non- articulated human bone specimens of both sexes, 25 wet specimens (different types of snakes), 136 various types of weapons, 110 poisonous specimens, 14 charts, 25 different instruments and appliances along with 150 photographs, 02 CDs and a good number of radiological plates (exposed X-ray films)---all of medicolegal importance for demonstration purpose to the students.

3.12 PATHOLOGY, BACTERIOLOGY & PARASITOLOGY

The Department of Pathology and Microbiology of National Institute of Homoeopathy is well-arranged Department for the IInd B.H.M.S. students under W.B.U.H.S. The Department of Pathology and Microbiology were upgrading the Department by **Inducting Microbiology Laboratory** by the Director of NIH which improve the standard of institution is of National importance.

The department is well equipped with teaching aids like charts (17), Audio-Visual aids (OHP, Laptop, LED monitor etc.) and other required to smooth running the classes.

The department has Pathology museum consists of **56 nos.** of malignant specimens. For teaching pathogenesis with morphological characteristics audio visual tools are frequently using by the faculty. The syllabus is well prepared in Power Point and explained during classes through audio visual aids for better understanding. In addition Dewinter capture 4.1 software used to demonstrate of macroscopic & microscopic characteristics of topic covered in syllabus.

54 students of 25th batch are regularly attending the classes. The pass percentage of 24th batch (2014-2015) was 100% with one student gets distinction.

3.13 DEPARTMENT OF PAEDIATRICS (PG)

The department is functioning as a separate department as per the regulations of CCH, New Delhi since 2009 when the MD (Hom) course in the subject Paediatrics is introduced here at NIH. Presently the department is shifted to the new Academic Block in the specified area where there are separate Lecture Hall, Departmental Library, Laboratory, Rooms for Head / In-charge and Teaching Faculty as well as PGT's. Audio-visual facilities are available in the Lecture Hall and the Laboratory.

The intake capacity for MD (Hom) in the subject is three (03) per session. There is one full time Lecturer, one Guest Professor and two part-time Guest Lecturer available in the department. One full time professor is looking after the department as in-charge of the department and coordinating the activities of the department.

The department is well equipped as per regulations of CCH, New Delhi. There is one dedicated Paediatric O.P.D. attached to the Hospital. Six Beds are available in the I.P.D. where Patients are admitted regularly from Paediatric O.P.D. Regular Journal Club, Clinical case discussion, weekly departmental Seminar and monthly general seminars are conducted by the department of Paediatrics.

3.14 LIBRARY & INFORMATION SERVICES

The Library & Information Services division provides the information system which is taken care of by efficient library staff. At present, there are more than 21000 books and 20 subscribed journals in the library. Institute has its own website, http://www.nih.nic.in developed in the year 2002. Current Awareness Services (CAS) and Flash (Internet information on homoeopathy world) are provided and partial automation has been achieved through WINISIS software and newly launched LIBSYS software for total automation of library documents. One archive for rare books, including some rare non-English (German, Spanish etc.) books, is available as reference books.

Reprography, binding, photography, A/V etc., are also provided. Five PG Departmental Libraries were set up with the help of the Central Library & Information Service Department. Presently all the UG departments also have Departmental Library.

4. MEDICAL SERVICES

INTRODUCTION

National Institute of Homoeopathy, an autonomous Institution under Ministry of AYUSH, Govt. of India is having 100 bedded hospital for imparting teaching Homoeopathy to post graduate and under graduate students.

The Hospital is consisting of **Out Patient** and **In-patient** departments providing medical services at a registration fee of Rs. 5.00 per patient & nominal charges for investigations have been imposed from the year 2011 onwards. The outpatient department functioning from 9.00 a.m. till the last patient is served. Apart from general medicine, some specialized clinics are also in service. A large number of different types of patients from far flung areas seek treatment through Homoeopathic systems of medicine. The hospital has investigation facilities viz. **Clinical Pathology**, **Biochemistry**, **Radiology**, **Ultra-Sonography**, **Lung function test** and **ECG** etc. The Institute has been presently providing Indoor facilities through 100 bedded hospitals of which 08 beds are earmarked for **Surgery**, 06 for **Paediatrics** and 04 for **Maternity**. As this is an academic institution, patients suffering from different ailment are admitted for treatment as well as for clinical training of the Under-Graduate and Post-Graduate students. Considering the increasing demand of Homoeopathic treatment, the Ministry of AYUSH, approved the construction of Hospital extension building G+3 at the site adjacent to existing hospital building. The bed strength of the Hospital will be enhanced to 250 beds in a phase wise manner. This report shall discuss hospital services provided under following heads-

4.1 OUT PATIENT DEPARTMENT (OPD)

The National Institute of Homoeopathy Hospital (NIH) is rendering valuable health care services in Homoeopathy to the needy patients from areas far and around. Over the years there is increase in service load due to increase in number of patients attending OPD daily at NIH. The Out-patients and Inpatients Departments of the Institute provide medical care to the patients suffering from different ailments. Three lakh ten thousand one hundred and forty four (310144) patients visited the NIH OPD during the FY 2015-2016 out of which 306855 patients were attended OPD at NIH, Salt Lake Complex, Kolkata and 3289 patients were attended at POPD, Kalyani, Dist.-Nadia, W.B.

PERIPHERAL OPD (POPD)

A peripheral OPD is functioning once in a week at NIH Herbal Garden Complex, Kalyani, Dist.-Nadia, about 50 Km. away from NIH, Salt Lake Complex. The physicians, PGTs and internees are regularly attending this OPD. The medicines are dispensed to the patients at free of costs. During the FY 2015-2016, **3289** (Three thousand two hundred and eighty nine) patients were provided treatment there. The monthly average patient turnout was 274.

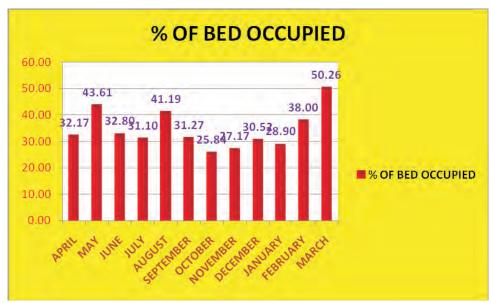

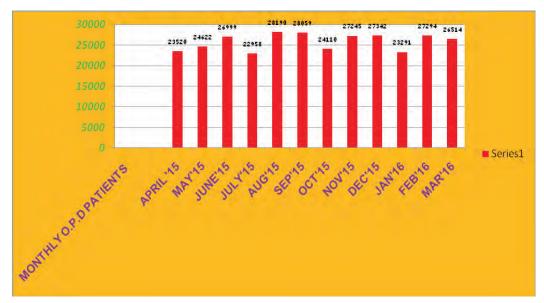

HOSPITAL RECORD KEEPING:

A systematic data entry and record-keeping of all IPD patients has been initiated and records from 2008-09 to 2013-14 are completed and entered in the database. This is a step forward in the direction of Medical records Division of NIH, envisioned for the future when new hospital building is completed.

HOSPITAL KITCHEN & DIET:

At present raw materials are procured from suppliers and prescribed diet for the admitted patients are prepared by our own staff in the In- House- Kitchen of the Institute. The dietitian looks into special requirements or recommendations for the diet of the patients. The hospital kitchen has been modernized to serve for 250 bedded hospital patients after expansion program is being done.

DISPENSARY:

The prescribed medicine of the IPD & OPD patients are dispensed from the In-House Dispensary of the hospital. Emphasis is given to dispense quality medicines to the patients at free of cost. Necessary care has been taken so that every patient is being dispensed accurately the prescribed medicine. Adequate stock of medicine is maintained as per the approved Formulary Committee of the Institute.

AMBULANCE SERVICE:

The hospital also provides Ambulance Service for transportation of the patients when required in emergency. Ambulance is available round the clock for which driver's accommodation inside the campus for service as and when required is arranged.

4.3 OPERATION THEATRE:

The Hospital is having well equipped, two modern Operation Theatres with apparatus/instruments, such as pulse-ox meter, diathermy, portable ECG and X-ray etc. Operation techniques are demonstrated to the students for training. The Institute has a labour room and provides antenatal and post-natal care to the mother and child.

4.6 MEDICINAL HERB GARDEN

The herb garden at Kalyani, about 50 km away from Kolkata, was envisaged for building up of repository of authentic specimens of living herbs for research and academic purposes and acclimatization of exotic herbs in the fertile plains of gangetic alluvium in West Bengal, in order to develop import substitutes, for catering to the needs of local pharmaceutical industries as well as export oriented products. The garden, spread over about 25 acres of land has grown and maintained 100 different species of medicinal plants, including 10 exotic species. Steps have been taken to develop the infrastructure.

1.5 Kilometer of road network in the garden have been developed with excavated earth from the existing water body in the garden and sprinkler irrigation system for 8 acres of land has been developed.

Medicinal crop Alfalfa has registered a good yield.

Among the medicinal species Piper nigrum, Gymnemasylvestris, Menthaarvensis and sugar substitute Stevia rebaudiana have been introduced in the garden.

Medicinal crops Linumusitatissimum & Cuminumcyminum registered good yield demonstrating that wide range of commercial crops can be grown successfully at the garden.

The proposal already been taken by the N.I.H authority to cultivate, nurturing and utilizing some medicinal herbs in relation to manufacturing mother tincture for institute's own use and marketing. For this purpose one horticulturist will be appointed very soon.

For beautification of herbal garden one small flower garden adjacent of main entrance is well maintained. One peripheral OPD is running once in a week (Friday) in this Herb garden premises, more than 100 patients are attending for homeopathy treatment.

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Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the Accounts of National Institute of Homoeopathy, Kolkata for the year ended 31 March 2016.

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of National Institute of Homoeopathy, Kolkata as at 31 March 2016, the Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 20(1) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Power and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit has been entrusted for the period upto 2017-18. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Institute's Management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum-performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports / CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by the management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
- 4. Based on our audit, we report that:
- i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
- ii. The Balance Sheet and Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format prescribed by the Ministry of Finance, Government of India.
- iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Institute as required in so far as it appears from our examination of books.
- iv. We further report that

Comments of Accounts

A. Balance Sheet

1.1 Liabilities

1.1.1 Earmarked Fund (Schedule-3) ₹ 656.09 crore

1.1.1.1 The above head was overstated by ₹ 0.85 Lakh unspent balance of Grants-in-Aid (₹ 0.85 Lakh) received from the Government of India for creation of assets had been exhibited under the fund instead of showing the liability the liability under Current Liability and Provisions. This had resulted in understatement of Current Liability and Provisions to the same extent.

This had also resulted in understatement of Capital Fund to the same extent.

1.1.1.2 Current Liabilities & Provisions (Schedule - 7): ₹ 185.71 Lakh

The above head is understated by ₹40.45 lakh as the Statutory Liabilities under the Current Liabilities & Provisions exhibited as 'Nil'. Checking of records revealed that the Institute had paid total amount of ₹288.95 lakh to National Project Construction Corporation for construction (NPCC) work during the year 2015-16 for which Service Tax was payable for ₹40.45 lakh. But the Institute had not made any provision for the known Statutory Liabilities for

the year 2015-16. Non-provision of Statutory liabilities had also resulted in understatement of Fixed Assets (Work-in-Progress) due to non inclusion of Service Tax component as capital expenditure with the expenditure of Fixed Assets.

B. Assets

1.2.1 Current Assets, Loans and Advances (Schedule-11): ₹ 3529.98

The above head was understated by the amount of negative balance of cash at Bank ₹ 69.37 lakh exhibited under Current Account. The negative balance had been adjusted against the positive bank balances in other Accounts. Exhibition of minus/negative balances instead of showing that amount under Current Liabilities and Provision (bank overdraft) resulted in understatement of Current Liabilities and Provisions by ₹ 69.37 lakh.

B. Income & Expenditure Accounts:

2.1 Expenditure

2.1.1 Depreciation (Schedule 8): ₹ 579.19 Lakh

The above head remained understated by $\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{?}}}$ 0.33 lakh due to short charging of depreciation of $\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{?}}$ 0.33 lakh on the value of Assets of Laboratory Equipments (worth $\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{?}}}$ 2.64 lakh) included wrongly with the Plant, Machinery and Equipments. Short charging of depreciation was done due to charging of depreciation @ 7.5% instead of @20% on Laboratory Equipments (for less that six months).

This resulted in understatement of Excess of Expenditure over Income by ₹ 0.33 lakh for the year ended 31 March 2016.

2.1.2 Prior Period Expenses (Schedule -21A):₹ 1018.27 lakh

The above amount remained understated by ₹ 148.12 lakh as the Institute had not included the a whole amount of depreciation of ₹ 1266.00 lakh which was not charged for the period from 2012 to 2015 as pointed out in previous Audit Report. Instead the Institute had charged only ₹ 1117.88 lakh as Prior Period Expenditure. Non-charging of prior period depreciation resulted in understatement of Excess of Expenditure over Income by ₹ 148.12 lakh at the end of 2015-16.

C. General

- 3.1 The Institute in its 'Significant Accounting Policies' (Schedule-24) appended with Main Balance Sheet disclosed that retirement benefits of the employees have been accounted for on cash basis. However, as per instructions of the Common Format of Accounts, the retirement benefits needs to be reflected on actuarial basis. Despite mention in previous years' Audit Report, the Institute had not taken any corrective action to this effect.
- 3.2 The Earmarked Fund was overstated by ₹ 0.12 lakh as the amount recovered / contributed by the employees towards NPS Fund was to be transferred to NSDL and no part of it should have been shown as own Fund (under any head of Accounts), but the Institute had retained the amount of ₹ 0.12 lakh in NPS Fund under Earmarked Fund as own Fund without transferring the unspent fund to NSDL.
- 3.3 Balance Sheet of GPF account exhibited an amount of ₹ 397.23 lakh under Members Account while Broadsheet of General Provident Fund (GPF) account exhibited ₹ 407.01 lakh under Members' balance as on 31 March 20126. This resulted in discrepancy of ₹ 9.78 lakh which needs to be reconciled.

D. Grants-in-aid

The Institute is mainly financed by grants from the Government of India. During the year (2015-16) the Institute had received total grants of ₹ 2950.00 lakh both under Plan and Non-Plan (Plan ₹ 2100.00 lakh, Non-Plan ₹ 350.00 lakh and Plan grant for Capital Expenditure for ₹ 500.00 lakh) including receivable amount of Non Plan grant of ₹ 100.00 lakh of 2014-15.

Out of the total grants of ₹ 2950.00 lakh, the Institute had spent ₹ 2170.00 lakh (Plan: ₹ 1937.00 lakh, Non-plan: ₹ 233.00 lakh and Plan grant for Capital Expenditure: ₹ Nil), leaving an unspent grant of ₹ 780.00 lakh (Plan ₹ 663.00 lakh and Non-Plan ₹ 117.00 lakh).

E. Net effect

The Net effect of the comments given in the preceding paragraphs is that both Assets and Liabilities of the Institute remained understated by ₹ 109.82 lakh as at 31 March 2016 and Excess of Expenditure over Income remained understated by ₹ 148.45 lakh for the year ended 31 March 2016.

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SCHEDULE 24 – SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Principal activities of the Institute are to impart education, provide health care facilities and promoting research activities in Homoeopathy.

1. ACCOUNTING CONVENTION

- (I) The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention, unless otherwise stated and on the accrual method of accounting.
- (ii) Government Grants, against which sanction orders are issued within 31st March are taken into account as income for that financial year, on accrual basis.
- (iii) The Institute's accounts reflect the utilisation of the grants received/receivable from the Government of India and other related incomes received/accrued up to 31st March. Therefore, liabilities, though known and admissible, are provided for in the accounts of respective year only to the extent of fund available.
- (iv) All other known incomes, if accrued within 31st March, whether received or not, are taken into account on accrual basis.
- (v) Liabilities for expenses over Rs.1000/- to the extent known, up to a cut-off date and admissible are accounted for. Similarly, payments in advance for subsequent accounting period are accounted for as advance/pre-paid expenses.

2. FIXED ASSETS

For any expenditure incurred for creation of Capital Asset utilizing Grant received for the purpose and for purchase of other assets the Corpus/Capital Fund Account is credited by capitalizing from the Earmarked Fund for Capital Grant and General Plan Grants received (the balance available plan grant is utilized for revenue expenditure). When the Assets are sold/condemned or otherwise disposed off, the respective asset account is credited by the written down book value of the asset and the difference between written down value and net realized value is exhibited as profit/loss on disposal of obsolete assets and credited/debited to income and expenditure account respectively.

Assets are shown at gross value less accumulated depreciation provided in the accounts upto the end of the year.

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3. DEPRECIATION AND AMORTISATION OF LEASEHOLD LAND

Depreciation on assets has been calculated on the provisional method on the written down value of the assets at the prevailing rates of depreciation specified in the Income Tax Act, 1961 as amended from time to time. The depreciation has been provided in the books on additions to the assets and put to use during the year for a period of less than 180 days in the financial year is provided at 50% of the prescribed rates. The total depreciation calculated on all depreciable assets during the year, is provided for by charging the Income and Expenditure Account and for the depreciation accumulated upto 2014-15 not provided for in the books as per audit has been debited to Prior Period Adjustment Account.

4. FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS

Transactions denominated in foreign currency are accounted in INR (Indian Rupee) at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of transaction. No expenditure in foreign currency has been incurred by the Institute during the current and previous year.

5. RETIREMENT BENEFITS

No liability towards gratuity payable on death / retirement / termination of employees including leave encashment benefit is provided on actuarial basis in the accounts. All such retirement benefits are recorded on the basis of actual payment.

6. SET OFF

Advances to staff and third parties are set off against the corresponding liabilities by charging the relevant expenditure, to the extent linked.

7. INVESTMENT

The Institute has no Investment other than Term Deposits in the Nationalised Banks. As per Memorandum of Association, Rules and Regulatio]ns and Bye Laws of the Institute, the Institute's entire investment are made with Nationalised Bank in Short Term Bank deposits.

8. INVENTORY VALUATION

Medicines and consumables purchased by the Institute has duly been recorded and maintained by dispensary and store. Quantitative details are available with respective department. The value of stock as at the year end has not been incorporated in the books.

Receipts and payments of the Sub Funds, books of accounts of which are maintained separately, for the year incorporated in the General Fund Book. The fund utilised out of Fund for Grant for Capital Expenditure during the year transferred to Capital/Corpus Fund leaving the unutilised amount as balance of the Fund.
- In the opinion of the Management, the current assets, loans and advances have a value on realisation in the ordinary course of business, equal at least to the aggregate amount shown in the Balance Sheet.

	1.1.1 Earmarked Fund(Schedule-3): ₹ 656.09 lakh		
1.1.1.1	The above head was overstated by ₹ 0.85 Lakh as unspent balance		

of Grants in Aid (₹ 0.85 Lakh) received from the Government of India for creation of assets had been exhibited under the Fund instead of showing the liability under Current Liability and Provisions. This had resulted in understatement of Current Liability and Provisions to the same extent

1.1.1.2 | Current Liabilities & Provisions (Schedule-7): ₹ 185.71 lakh

The above head is understated by ₹ 40.45 lakh as the Statutory Liabilities under the Current Liabilities & Provisions exhibited as 'Nil'. Checking of records revealed that the Institute had paid total amount of ₹ 288.95 lakh to National Project Construction Corporation for construction (NPCC) work during the year 2015-16 for which Service Tax was payable for ₹ 40.45 lakh. But the Institute had not made any provision for the known Statutory Liabilities for the year 2015-16. Non-provision of Statutory liabilities had also resulted in understatement of Fixed Assets (Work-in-Progress) due to non inclusion of Service Tax component as capital expenditure with the expenditure of Fixed Assets

1.2 Assets

1.2.1 Current Assets, Loans and Advances (Schedule-11): ₹ 3529.98 lakh

The above head was understated by the amount of negative balance of cash at Bank of 69.37 lakh exhibited under Current Account. The negative balance had been adjusted against the positive bank balances in other Accounts. Exhibition of minus/negative balances instead of showing that amount under Current Liabilities and Provision (bank overdraft) resulted in understatement of Current Liabilities and Provisions by ₹ 69.37 lakh.

B. Income and Expenditure Account.

2.1 Expenditure

2.1.1 Depreciation (Schedule-8): ₹ 579.19 lakh

The above head remained understated by $\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{$\sim}}} 0.33$ lakh due to short charging of depreciation of $\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{$\sim}}}} 0.33$ lakh on the value of Assets of Laboratory Equipments (worth $\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{\stackrel{?}{$\sim}}} 2.64$ lakh) included wrongly with the Plant, Machinery and Equipments. Short charging of depreciation was done due to charging of depreciation @ 7.5% instead of @20% on Laboratory Equipments (for less than six months).

This resulted in understatement of Excess of Expenditure over Income by ₹ 0.33 lakh for the year ended 31 March 2016.

2.1.2 | Prior period expenses (Schedule 21A): ₹ 1018.27 lakh

The above amount remained understated by ₹ 148.12 lakh as the Institute had not included the whole amount of depreciation of ₹ 1266.00 lakh which was not charged for the period from 2012 to 2015 as pointed out in previous Audit Report. Instead the Institute had charged only ₹ 1117.88 lakh as Prior Period Expenditure. Non-charging of prior period depreciation resulted in understatement of Excess of Expenditure over Income by ₹ 148.12 lakh at the end of 2015-16.

C. General

3.1 The Institute in its 'Significant Accounting Policies' (Schedule-24)

appended with Main Balance Sheet disclosed that retirement benefits of the employees have been accounted for on cash basis. However, as per instructions of the Common Format of Accounts, the retirement benefits needs to be reflected on actuarial basis. Despite mention in previous years' Audit Report, the Institute had not taken any corrective action to this effect.

- The Earmarked Fund was overstated by ₹ 0.12 lakh as the amount recovered / contributed by the employees towards NPS Fund was to be transferred to NSDL and no part of it should have been shown as own Fund (under any head of Accounts), but the Institute had retained the amount of `0.12 lakh in NPS Fund under Earmarked Fund as own Fund without transferring the unspent fund to NSDL.
- Balance Sheet of GPF account exhibited an amount of 397.23 lakh under Members Account while Broadsheet of General Provident Fund (GPF) account exhibited 407.01 lakh under Members' balance as on 31 March 2016. This resulted in discrepancy of 9.78 lakh which needs to be reconciled.

D Grants-in-Aid

The Institute is mainly financed by grants from the Government of India. During the year (2015-16), the Institute had received total grants of ₹2950.00 lakh both under Plan and Non Plan heads (Plan ₹2100.00 lakh, Non Plan ₹350.00 lakh and Plan grant for Capital Expenditure for ₹500.00 lakh) including receivable amount of Non Plan grant of 100.00 lakh of 2014-15. Out of the total grants of ₹2950.00 lakh, the Institute had spent ₹2170.00 lakh (Plan: ₹1937.00 lakh, Non-plan: ₹233.00 lakh and Plan grant for Capital Expenditure: Nil), leaving an unspent grant of ₹780.00 lakh (Plan 663.00 lakh and Non-Plan ₹117.00 lakh).

E Net Effect

The net effect of the comments given in the preceding paragraphs is that both Assets and Liabilities of the Institute remained understated by ₹ 109.82 lakh as at 31 March 2016 and Excess of Expenditure over Income remained understated by ₹ 148.45 lakh for the year ended 31 March 2016.

- v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.
- vi. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements, read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in the Annexure to this Audit Report, give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India
