INTRODUCTION

National Institute of Homoeopathy was established on 10th December, 1975 in Kolkata an autonomous organisation under the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, Govt. of India. It is registered under the West Bengal Societies Registration Act XXVI of 1961 with Registration No. S/17640 of 1976-77. Started functioning in a rented building at 118, Raja Ram Mohan Sarani, Calcutta-700009 (Marwari Hospital Building) located at Amherst Street, Kolkata. On 16th August 1986 it was shifted to its present sprawling location at Block-GE, Sector-III, Salt Lake, Kolkata-700106.

Ministry of AYUSH was formed on 9th November 2014 to ensure the optimal development and propagation of AYUSH systems of health care in the country and since then National Institute of Homoeopathy, Kolkata is functioning as an Autonomous organisation under the Ministry of AYUSH, Govt. of India.

The Main Campus (administrative campus) of the Institute is located in its sprawling campus in the heart of the Salt Lake City at Block-GE, Sector-III, Salt Lake, Kolkata-700106; surrounded by some of the prominent land marks viz. CRPF Campus, Calcutta Heart Clinic, Sushrut Eye Hospital, GD-Market, 12 No. Tank of Salt Lake, Custom quarters, etc. The campus spreads over a land of 16 acres; administrative building, G+7 storied new Academic cum Library Building, 100 bed attached Homoeopathic Hospital, separate Hostel for Undergraduate boys' and girls' students and internees, one Auditorium with 500 seating capacity and 04 nos. of quarters for the Resident Medical Officers, gymnasium is situated in the main campus.

The residential campus of the Institute is located at one-kilometer distance from the main campus, at JC-Block, Sector-III, Salt Lake, Kolkata-700 106 spreading over a land of 10 acres. Separate gents and ladies hostel for Postgraduate Trainees, International Students Hostel with all modern facilities for accommodating foreign students, 23 nos. of staff quarters, and one guest house is located in this campus. AMRI Hospital, KB-KC Block, South Bidhan Nagar Police Station, All India Institute of Hygiene and Public Health, S.N.Bose Institute of Basic Science are some of the prominent land marks near the residential campus.

Herbal Garden stretched over a land area about of 25 acres at Kalyani (about 60 Km. from Kolkata) is maintained by the Institute, envisaged for acclimatizing exotic species of plants, and to build a repository of authentic specimens of medicinal plants for use by students and researchers.

That apart the construction of the upcoming "National Institute of Homoeopathy, Kolkata Extended Campus" on 10 acres of land at Sector - VIII, Narela, New Delhi is in full swing and expected to be operational in near future. It will have a 100-bed referral Hospital for facilitating clinical research. The patient care will be provided mainly through Homoeopathy at secondary and tertiary level.

> To conduct experiments and develop patterns of teaching in undergraduate and postgraduate education on various aspects of Homoeopathy.

MANAGEMENT

The Governing Body is the apex body of the Institute. Ministry of AYUSH, Govt. of India monitors the day to day functioning of the Institute, on behalf of the Governing Body. The Governing body appoints a Standing Finance Committee, which scrutinizes the proposal of the Institute involving the financial matters. There is a secretariat setup in the department of AYUSH to render effective administrative support to the Governing Body and SFC in managing the affairs of the Institute. The Director is the Chief Executive of the Institute.



2. ACADEMIC ACTIVITIES

The Institute is recognised by the Central Council of Homoeopathy, to conduct 5½ years BHMS Degree course in Homoeopathy viz., Bachelor of Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery; and from 2004 - 05 to conduct 3 years M.D. (Homoeopathy) courses. The Institute was formerly affiliated to the Calcutta University and from BHMS 16th Batch (session 2004 - 05) onwards, the Institute is affiliated to the West Bengal University of Health Sciences, Kolkata. At present 93 UG seats and 36 PG seats are available in NIH, Kolkata.

2.1 UNDER GRADUATE COURSE

Bachelor of Homoeopathic Medicine and Surgery (BHMS) course of 5½ years duration (including one-year compulsory rotatory internship) was started in December 1987. For getting admission into the BHMS Degree Course students must qualify the National Eligibility-cum-Entrance Test (NEET-18) conducted by the Central Board of Secondary Education. Presently 30th batch is in role.

For the academic session 2018-19, total 93 seats were available for admission to the BHMS Course, out of which 88 students have taken admission.

2.2 POST GRADUATE COURSE

3 years duration M.D.(Homoeopathy)course was started in the academic year 1998. In this academic year six subjects viz. Organon of Medicine, Materia Medica, Repertory, Homoeopathic Pharmacy, Practice of Medicine and Paediatrics were available. Currently 20th batch has already been enrolled through All India AYUSH Post Graduate Entrance Test (AIAPGET), Ministry AYUSH, Govt. of India. The courses are as per the curriculum prescribed by the Central Council of Homoeopathy.

Subject wise distribution of seats in MD(Hom.) course

Out of total 36 seats, 2 seats were reserved for sponsored candidates of BIMSTEC countries, joining through Indian Council for Cultural Relation (ICCR) and 6 seats are earmarked for Central Govt. Nominees.

At present, 20th Batch have taken admission in October 2018, through All India AYUSH Post Graduate Entrance Test (AIAPGET), Ministry AYUSH, Govt. of India. 16th Batch of PGTs completed their course curriculum in this academic year. 17th Batch PGTs are preparing their dissertation work.19th Batch PGTs preparing to appear M.D. (Homoeopathy) Part-I Annual Examination 2019.

3. DEPARTMENTAL ACTIVITIES

There are thirteen Academic Departments apart from the Library & Information Services Division.

3.1 DEPARTMENT OF ANATOMY

The renovation and extension work of the department of Anatomy is functioning.

Sufficient numbers of charts, models, bone sets, skeletons, mounted specimens (viscera's, dissected regions and parts) are available to conduct both lectures as well as demonstration classes for the students. Sufficient numbers of dead bodies (dissected and un-dissected) are preserved in the department. A good number of Histological slides, projection slides, over head project sheets, 3D charts, laminated pictures, CD's, CPR's are available in the department.

Teaching aids like LCD, Laptop & Desktop, Over Head Projector, 35 mm slide Projector, Handy cam, Camera, sufficient number of Microscopes, etc are available in the department. Adequate numbers of text as well as reference books on Anatomy and on other subjects required for day-to-day teaching program are also available in the department. Interactive Pen-Drive is used in conducting lecture & demonstration classes.

Numbers of staff (both teaching and non-teaching) available in the department. One full time Professor & one Lecturer, one part time Lecturer, two full time Group-D staff and one part time Group-D staff are available in the department.

Besides taking classes for the undergraduate and postgraduate students, the faculty members of the department also deliver lectures periodically at Re-Orientation Training programme in the subject Anatomy as well as at MCH and CME programme as Resource Persons / Experts. The faculty members are also guiding the Internees for preparation of their Project work and Case Recording as well as attending Seminars and Symposia regularly

3.2 PHYSIOLOGY & BIO-CHEMISTRY

The Department is located on the 4thfloor of the new Academic cum Library Building. It has one Physiology Practical Laboratory, one Biochemistry Practical Laboratory, one Departmental Library, one demonstration room, one Museum, one room for HOD and one room for lecturer. As the shifting is done recently, Now the new upgraded laboratories with all modern furniture and infrastructure will be ready from June 2019 onwards.

The syllabus of the Physiology and biochemistry are made into PowerPoint presentation for the students to understand the subject well.

The syllabus of the Physiology and biochemistry are explained through the video also for best understanding of the each physiological phenomenon through clear visual understandings.

The department with sufficient microscopes, Instruments, books, specimens and teaching aids is to be considered as one of the best Physiology Department among the homoeopathic colleges.

Apart from theoretical and practical training in the subject of Physiology periodical assessment tests and tutorials are conducted to equip the students for their 1st BHMS examination under the West Bengal University of Health Sciences.

The efforts are reflected in the result of university examinations.

The faculty members are attending OPD on regular basis and admitting patients in the IPD as well as sharing a number of additional responsibilities. The faculty members are also guiding the internees for preparation of their Project work and Case Recording.

H.O.D. Dr. A.K.Chowdhury is holding the additional responsibility of HOD Cardiology and IT Coordinator. Dr Shishir Kumar Singh is approved PG Guide (Paediatrics) and holding the responsibility of Quality Improvement Officer (NABH), Member Secretary Hindi RajbhashaSamiti, ICC etc.

The department participates in weekly seminars, clinical and group discussions, workshops organized in the Institution.17th Batch PGTs have successfully completed their M.D.(Hom.) examination. Eight seats are filled in Materia Medica Department of 20th batch PGTs. The students are taught to be self-reliant under the constant guidance of teachers.

The department organized different lecture programmes, discussions & seminars in which the PG students and the faculty members participated and had discussions.

Almost all the PGTs of this department who have completed their M.D. (Hom.) from NIH, Kolkata are well settled in different positions in the Government jobs either in State Govt. or in Central Govt.

One teacher attended Leadership & Organization Development programme for women at COD, Hyderabad.

One teacher is the Chief Vigilance Officer of the Institute. Many teachers participated and were awarded for different categories in Vigilance awareness week.

The departmental teachers contributed literary works, delivered lectures as Resource person for different CME programmes conducted by CCRH and different Govt. colleges. One teacher is going to complete the Ph.D. programme in homoeopathy. 3.5 CASE TAKING AND REPERTORISATION

The subject of Repertory is taught to both under graduate and post graduate levels. In the under graduate level, the subject is being taught in the 3rd &4th BHMS. There are 09 seats available for PG in Repertory. Presently 26th and 27th batch undergraduate and 18th, 19th and 20th batches post graduate students are pursuing their study in the subject. The teaching of the subject aims at providing thorough knowledge in case taking; analysis of different aspects of cases and utility of various repertories in different types of cases. Regular departmental seminars, clinical discussion, journal club, case presentation and group discussion are carried out regularly in the department for PGTs. Repertory department is having repertory software for analysis and synthesis of the cases. Electronic gadgets are available in the department for smooth teaching of the students.

The departmental library caters to the daily needs of the students and teachers.

Practical / Clinical aspects of the subject are being taught through the OPD and IPD of the attached Hospital of the institute. Faculty, of the department includes two regular lecturers and two professors on the contractual basis.

3.6 HOMOEOPATHIC PHARMACY

The department imparts teaching to both BHMS as well as M.D (Hom) Homoeopathic Pharmacy students. They are exposed to different methods of preparing homoeopathic medicines and method of their standardization as per the standard Pharmacopoeia. Apart from theoretical and practical training in the subject of Homoeopathic Pharmacy periodical assessment tests and tutorials are conducted to equip the students for their 1st BHMS examination under the West Bengal University of Health Sciences.

The laboratory is well equipped with modern pharmaceutical instruments & apparatuses like distillation plant, hot air oven, water bath, and microscope, infrared moisture balance apart from other common instruments. The laboratory also contains 40 herbarium sheets with wooden frame, 123 herb specimen (dry), 27 herb specimens (preserved in FAA solution), 10 mineral specimens and 7 animal specimens and 10 botanical slides.

Department is also having 30 nos. of charts on Pharmacy & also enough chemicals for conducting practical classes. Departmental Library is having books in the subjects like HPI along with other reference books on medicinal plants and CD's on pharmacy. Department has a small medicinal plants garden in the institute campus. The students of 29th batch was taken to HPL Ghaziabad (UP) on 17.09.2018, Dr. Wilmer Schwabe Manufacturing Unit on 18.09.2018 and Regional Research Institute (under CCRH) at New Shimla on 19.09.18.

The department conducts PG course in Homoeopathic Pharmacy i.e., M.D. (Hom.) Homoeopathic Pharmacy with three admissions in each academic year. There is a separate air conditioned Post Graduate Laboratory where the PG trainees can do their dissertation/research work and practical. This lab has Electric Potentiser, Electric Triturator, Spectroscope, TLC apparatus, Colorimeter apparatus, digital balance, digital pH meter along with glass wares and chemicals.

Currently there are three Post Graduate batches in roll (18th ,19th and 20th). Three PGT from 17th batch (session 2015 to 2018) have passed MD (Hom) part II in March 2019. Three students of (session 2016-19) 18th batch, have passed the Part I examination in September 2018. Six PGTS have attended the national seminar on medicinal plants on 23rd and 24th March 2019.

The department has taken initiative and arranged the Special classes and Practical training on pharmaceutical analysis and Experimental Pharmacology for PG students in the month of January & February 2019 at National Institute of Pharmaceutical Education & Research (NIPER), Kolkata. The department has also arranged the Special classes and

Practical Training for PG students on Pharmaceutical analysis in the month of May & June 2018 at S.N.Bose institute, Salt Lake, Kolkata. The senior batch PG students have taken training on Industrial Pharmacy at Hahnemann Publishing Company (Hapco) at Titagarh from 23rd to 26th July 2018.

Dr.Gitasri Pal & Dr.M.Raja attended World Homoeopathic day on 10th and 11th April 2018 at Vigyan Bhavan, New Delhi organized by CCRH. Dr. Gitasri Pal & Four PGTs had attended a training programme at HPL Ghaziabad on Quality control of Homoeopathic drugs on 13th and 14th Dec 2018. Dr. M.Raja has attended three month IT course for AYUSH Professionals from 30.06.2018 to 26.10.2018. All the faculties of the department have attended the different Hom medical colleges under CCH as inspectors.

Prof. Dr. Dilip Panakkada functions as Coordinator, Intermediary Pharmacovigilance centre (Homoeopathy) from January 2018. He is also member of Homoeopathic Pharmacopoeia Committee and member of subcommittee on Drug Technical Advisory Board (Homoeopathy) Govt of India. Prof. Dr. Dilip Panakkada functions as Member Board of Studies, UG and PG in the subject Homoeopathic Pharmacy at West Bengal University of Health Sciences. Prof. Dr. Dilip Panakkada attended a meeting held on 6-7th October 2018 at NAAC, Bangalore as a member of the committee assigned to prepare Manual for health sciences for Universities and Colleges. He also attended a meeting at NAAC, Bangalore on 12th-13th Nov 2018 as Chairman of the sub-committee to prepare the draft Manual for Homoeopathy (health Science) colleges.

PHARMACOVIGILANCE (HOMOEOPATHY), NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF HOMOEOPATHY, KOLKATA - 700106.

The Ministry of AYUSH has introduced National Level Pharmacovigilance Programme for ASU & H Drugs during December 2017 to improve patient safety, though there were negligible number of adverse reactions to ASU & H Drugs. The All India Institute of Ayurveda, New Delhi has been designated as National Pharmacovigilance Coordination Centre (NPvCC) under this programme, while National Institute of Homoeopathy, Kolkata is designated as Intermediary Pharmacovigilance Centre (IPvC) for monitoring Homoeopathy Drugs. Dr Dilip Panakkada, Professor, NIH act as the Co-ordinator for the IPvC, Kolkata. The IPvC started functioning at NIH, Kolkata from 11th January 2018. The IPvC at National Institute of Homoeopathy was formally inaugurated on 10th August 2018 by Shri Roshan Jaggi, Jt. Sectretary, Ministry of AYUSH, GoI. E Mail address of the unit is: ipvc.nih.kolkata@gmail.com. A programme associate has appointed to the IPvC on 18th Sept 2018. Seven nos. of Peripheral Pharmacovigilance Centres (PPvC) were assigned under the IPvC, Kolkata viz., RRI(H) Gudiwada, RRI(H) Guwahati, DDPRCRI(H) Noida, RRI(H) Navi Mumbai, DACRRIH Kolkata, NHRIMH Kottayam Kerala, GHMC&H, Bhopal, MP. Four more centres were identified by the IPvC in its expansion phase.

The Peripheral Pharmacovigilance centres were supplied with the ADR reporting format as well as misleading advertisement reporting format as received from the NPvCC. The IPvC provides all the necessary support and guidance regarding the above as and when required. This centre reports ADRs/ADEs/Misleading advertisements to State Licensing Authority/Drug Controller as well as to National Centre (AIIA, New Delhi) apart from collecting and forwarding the reports from various Peripheral centres.

The IPvC, Kolkata conducted the first CME on pharmacovigilance on 20th September

2018. Around forty Doctors including, DMOs, HMOs from Government Hospitals of West Bengal and Professors/Readers/Lecturers/Programme Assistant / Programme Associates/Post graduate trainees etc. attended the programme. The participants were supplied with draft ADR/ADE format along with the Drugs and Magic Remedies act.

A Two day training programme for the Co-ordinators of IPvCs as well as PPvCs was organized by AIIA, New Delhi at Indian Pharmacopoeia Commission, Ghaziabad on 19th and 20th March 2019 which was attended by Prof Dr Dilip Panakkada, Coordinator, IPvC, NIH, Kolkata.

3.7 DEPARTMENT OF PRACTICE OF MEDICINE & PAEDIATRICS

The Department is an integrated unit for both undergraduate and postgraduate courses of the affiliating university in the specialty of Practice of Medicine. The subject of Paediatrics at undergraduate level (BHMS) is covered by this Department; while there is a separate Department of Paediatrics which deals solely with the postgraduate course [MD (Hom) in Paediatrics].

This Department has functioned with three full-time faculty members - one Professor and two Lecturers. There are two senior specialist physicians who are attached as Guest Faculty, for assistance in teaching/training of undergraduate/postgraduate students and in ensuring better management of hospital patients. The Department has been functioning from its new location in the first floor of the New Academic cum Library Building from March 2014.

The intake capacity for MD (Hom) in the subject (Practice of Medicine) has continued to be three from inception. The first batch was admitted in the session 2009-10 and the latest batch to be admitted is the tenth in the session 2018-19. Seven batches have passed out (totaling 19 PG students). The eighth, ninth and tenth batches are currently pursuing their

Course (comprising 8 PG students).

As in the previous year, the postgraduate students under guidance of faculty members have published several scientific papers. The postgraduate students have presented Institutional Seminars.

In undergraduate curriculum, the faculty takes classes (Lectures, Tutorials, Practicals) during the BHMS Courses [earlier 2nd, 3rd, 4th (Old Regulations); currently 3rd, 4th (New Regulations)], guides intern projects, and supervises the training of Internship in accordance with CCH norms. The faculty attends on regular basis patients in OPD and IPD of the hospital of NIH.

Both Lecturers Dr Gautam Pal and Dr Subhash Chaudhary are Guide and Examiner of MD (Hom) course. Both are members of the committee of WBUHS for framing syllabus of Practice of Medicine for MD (Hom). Both attended the Scientific Convention on World Homoeopathy Day 2018 organised by CCRH at New Delhi. Both acted as Inspector/Visitor for CCH Inspection of Homoeopathic Medical College(s).

Lecturer Dr Subhash Chaudhary is undergoing PhD course under WBUHS (The West Bengal University of Health Sciences) with study center in NIH. He is examiner for BHMS. He has presented Scientific Paper at 'International Conference on Conglomeration of Health Traditions in Bharatvarsha' at Bengaluru. He has been Resource person at CME at Tata Steel Rural Health Development, Jamshedpur. He underwent Certified Life Saver (First Aid and Basic Life Support) training and has become certified as Certified Life Saver. He attended CME in Pharmacovigilance at NIH. He has published several scientific papers in homoeopathic journals.

Dr Subhash Chaudhary was entrusted responsibility for retrieval of Document of Land Deed of NIH which he successfully carried out. He continued to be Nodal Officer for 'National Data Sharing and Accessibility Policy 2012'. He has been the Nodal Officer for 'National LED Programme' implementation at NIH. He has been entrusted with work (ROM: Responsibility of Management) in connection with NABH accreditation of the NIH Hospital.

Lecturer Dr Gautam Pal is the Editor of the Bulletin of NIH. He is moderator, paper setter and examiner of different Universities including AIIMS Bhubaneswar. He was Coordinator and Resource Person of 3rd Foundation Training Programme for Central Health Services doctors. He has successfully completed Praveen and Pragya Courses in Hindi. He underwent the three day NABH Training. He attended as invited expert in a live-programme in DD-Bangla on Jana Arogya Yojna.

Dr Gautam Pal has been member of various administrative committees: Book & Journal Purchase Committee of NIH; Organising Committee for Foundation Stone Laying Ceremony of New Girls' Hostel at NIH; Committee for Election of NIH Students' Council; Committee from NIH Kolkata for Foundation Stone Laying Ceremony of NIH Narela; and Member-Secretary of Committee for Medical Benefits for NIH Employees and Pensioners.

Professor Dr D Basu, who is the Head of the Department, continued to be a member of Board of Studies for both Undergraduate and Postgraduate Courses of the affiliating university. In the 3rd Regional Science Congress (Southern Region) organized by the Department of Science & Technology, Govt of West Bengal, Dr Basu acted as Judge for Technical Session (Medical Sciences Section) as well as the Chairperson for the 'U N Brahmachari Lecture'. He acted as Judge in the Competitive Short Paper Session in the

Scientific Conference of Medical College Ex-Students' Association. He was invited as Guest Speaker in two monthly scientific programmes of the Homoeopathic Bigyan Parishad.

Dr D Basu attended meetings in connection with research collaboration with NIPER (National Institute of Pharmaceutical Education Research). He underwent the three day NABH Training. He was Judge in the Debate Programme of Vigilance Awareness Week. The School Health programme of the Institute was held under the overall supervision of Dr D Basu.

3.8 SURGERY

- Statistical Data: Since November 2016, OT is temporarily non-functioning. The OT is going to be shifted in new hospital building (2nd Floor) very soon.
- Faculty members: Full Timer: 01 (One) Lecturer & HOD, Guest- 05 (Five) 01-General Surgeon, 01-Oncologist, 01-ENT Surgeon, 01-Dental Surgeon, 01-Ophthalmologist

• Activities of the Department:

- i) The Dept. of Surgery has already been shifted to new Academic-cum-Library building.
- ii) Both theory and practical classes are held for the 2nd & 3rd BHMS students as per schedule laid down in CCH norms in Class rooms, IPD, OPD respectively, The students, interns, PGTs are being acquainted with the basic concepts and techniques in Surgical diseases in OPD and IPD. The scopes and limitations of Homoeopathy are also being taught by the concerned Departmental faculty.
 - The Dept. has more than 35 charts, models etc. for demonstration to the students.
- iii) Students, Interns and PGTs are being trained in the basics of General Surgery, Systemic Surgery, Eye, ENT and Dental surgery both in OPD and IPD by the concerned specialist. At the same time homoeopathic treatment is provided for the cases by qualified homoeopathic physician.
- iv) Students, Interns and PGTs are being trained in the basics of first aid to a victim/patient in collaboration with St. John Ambulance Association, West Bengal. Apart from General Surgery, ENT, Eye, Dental classes are also organized by the Dept. of Surgery along with their respective OPD where students are attending to learn from respective specialist. Theory classes of those area are also taken by the concern specialist along with their homoeopathic counterparts are taken by the HOD, Surgery who is a qualified homoeopathic doctor.
- v) There is a special Oncology OPD in every Tuesday runned by a concerned specialist that helps the students, Internees and PGTs for their learning purposes.

3.9 OBSTETRICS AND GYNAECOLOGY

The Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology is involved in teaching of 2nd and 3rd B.H.M.S. students. The department has one full-time lecturer and two guest faculty. The total number of theory classes taken per week is 11 hrs. and clinical classes taken per week is 16 hrs.

There are 6 charts, 08 specimens, 30 instruments, 3 dummy fetus, 2 fetal skulls, 6

contraceptives and 9 models available in the department. Classes of 2nd and 3rd B.H.M.S are conducted as per the norms of C.C.H. and West Bengal University of Health Sciences. Besides the everyday teaching activity, the department also participates in the weekly seminar. Students are also presenting papers in the classes weekly. Interns are given practical training in the O.P.D. and I.P.D. of NIH. Interns are being guided to carry out their assignment work under the departmental head. P.G.T.s whoever are allotted under the head of this department are guided for their dissertation work.

3.10 DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY MEDICINE

The Department of Community Medicine is involved in teaching of 4th BHMS students as well as research methodology and bio-statistics for PG students. The Department has one museum (for practical demonstration), where different instruments, models and charts related to different subject matters of PSM (e.g. family planning, nutrition, immunization, medical entomology, public health, etc.) is preserved for practical classes. All the classes, both theory and practical, are guided by the CCH regulation and in accordance with the curriculum prescribed by the University.

The students visit different places of public health importance as part of their field visits in accordance with the prescribed university curriculum. The 25th BHMS batch of NIH was taken for first field visit to Rural Health & Training Centre, Singur which is the field practice area of All India Institute of Hygiene & Public Health. The second field visit was to Mother Diary Calcutta, at Dankuni in two groups on 06.04.2018 & 07-04-2018 where the students are exposed to methods of pasteurizations of milk in large scale and production of different milk products such as ghee, curd etc. They were also taken to Indira Gandhi Water Treatment Plant, Palta, Barakpore, on 12.04.2018, where they were exposed on how the water from the river Hooghly is purified and safe drinking water is supplied to the whole city of Kolkata. The students were also taken to Urban Health Centre, Chetla, Kolkata on 17-05-2018. The students also visited National Institute of Cholera & Enteric Diseases under ICMR for exposure to various research activities that are been carried out by the said organisation.

Every year from 10th January to 16th January the Homoeopathic Camp at **Gangasagar Mela** is being organized by this Dept. with the help from Hospital Section.

The Interns, 24th & 25th batch, were sent to ID Hospital as well as to Bidhannagar Subdivisional Hospital for two weeks training in management of infectious diseases and for exposure to various National Health Programmes that were being carried out through Primary health centre respectively on monthly rotation basis.

3.11 FORENSIC MEDICINE & TOXICOLOGY

The Dept. of Forensic Medicine and Toxicology is headed by a full-time Professor assisted by a full time Reader till 11th Feb., 2019, and there after only by a full time Reader as the HOD since transfer of the previous Professor to NEIAH, Shillong. Regular theoretical, practical and tutorial classes for 2nd BHMS students are taken by the faculty(s). The teacher(s) of the department are also involved in patient care and training of interns as well as PGTs' in the hospital OPD and IPD.

Students were taken to R.G.Kar Medical College and Hospital Morgue, Kolkata for

demonstration of medico-legal autopsies [postmortems]. Regular classes both theoretical, practical/tutorial were taken as per schedule. For updating the knowledge of the students internal assessment theoretical, practical and oral examinations were conducted by the faculty(s) of the department from time to time. Eighty four (84) students appeared in the regular batch and all of them successfully passed the university examination conducted by the West Bengal University of Health Sciences in 2018.

The departmental Museum is equipped with 30 wax models, 04 sets of dried non-articulated human bone specimens of both sexes, 25 wet specimens (different types of snakes), 136 various types of weapons, 110 poisonous specimens, 14 charts, 25 different instruments and appliances along with 150 photographs, 02 CDs and a good number of radiological plates (exposed X-ray films) --- all of medico-legal importance for demonstration purpose to the students.

3.12 PATHOLOGY & MICROBIOLOGY

- 1. Name of the Department: Department of Pathology & Microbiology.
- 2. Name of the faculty members: 1(ONE) Lecturer
- 3. Activities in this Department:
 - 1) The Department of Pathology and Microbiology of National Institute of Homoeopathy is well-arranged Department for the IIND B.H.M.S. students under W.B.U.H.S.
 - 2) The Department of Pathology and Microbiology is upgraded to New **Pathology and Microbiology Laboratory** in 4th floor of new academic building of NIH and presently the standard of the labs are at par with the other institution of National importance.
 - 3) There are 178 hrs. Lecture classes & 144 hrs. Practical classes (up to 31/03/19) in 28th batch and 20 hrs. Lecture classes & 16 hrs. Practical classes in 29th batch (up to 31/03/19) with good facilities for practicing independently by using individual microscope under table lamp which is beneficial for all the students even in cloudy & rainy weather.
 - 4) The **86 students** of **28th batch and 76 students of 29th batch** attended the regular classes separately.
 - 5) For the departmental Library, **43 No of books** in Pathology and Homoeopathic books are available in the Departmental Library of NIH.
 - 6) The Pathology museum consists of **56 nos.** of malignant specimens for the students of NIH as well as for different visitors from the different colleges in India and abroad, who keeps visiting.
 - 7) The department displayed the **17 nos.** of different display charts for the academic interest of the student, teachers and visitors, which will give a good impression on their minds.
 - 8) The bacteriological experiments like culture media, Hanging drop preparation and certain serological experiments are the curricular activities of student's practical learning.
 - 9) The department has one LED Monitor & one LAPTOP which help the students to

learn more pathogenesis with morphological characteristic by visual image & animations.

- 10) The syllabus of the pathology µbiology are made into PowerPoint presentation as well as video presentations for the students to understand the subject well.
- 11) The syllabus of the pathology & microbiology are explained through the video for best understanding of each diseases through clear visual understandings.
- 12) The practical demonstration of macroscopic & microscopic characteristics of all topics is imparted through the software known as dewinter capture pro 4.1 to the students for their improved understanding.
- 13) Every year there is nearly more than 90% of Candidates in II BHMS University Examination, who successfully passed out from the department.
- 14) The research activities like Photochemical studies of Homoeopathic Medicine and Microbial assay are going on along with academic activities to boost the research importance in the minds of the young students.

The New <u>upgraded Department along with Pathology and Microbiology laboratory</u> with all amenities (like sufficient microscope, books, specimens, Laboratory and teaching aids) is to be considered as one of the best **PATHOLOGY AND MICROBIOLOGY DEPARTMENT** among the Homoeopathic colleges in India.

3.13 DEPARTMENT OF PAEDIATRICS (PG)

The department is functioning as a separate department as per the regulations of CCH, New Delhi since 2009 when the MD (Hom) course in the subject Paediatrics is introduced here at NIH. The department is located at new Academic Block in the 1st Floor. There are separate Lecture Hall, Departmental Library, Laboratory, Rooms for Head / In-charge and Teaching Faculty as well as PGT's. Audio-visual facilities are available in the Lecture Hall and the Laboratory.

The intake capacity for MD (Hom) in the subject is three (03) per session. One part-time Guest Lecturer is available in the department. One full time professor is looking after the department as in-charge (Additional charge) of the department and one full-time lecturer coordinating the activities of the department.

The department is well equipped as per regulations of CCH, New Delhi. There is one dedicated Paediatric O.P.D. attached to the Hospital. Six Beds are available in the I.P.D. where Patients are admitted regularly from Paediatric O.P.D. Regular Journal Club, Clinical case discussion, weekly departmental Seminar and monthly general seminars are conducted by the department of Paediatrics.

3.14 LIBRARY & INFORMATION SERVICES

Library & Information Service Division was established in 1978 to act as an aid for the development of research and training in Homoeopathy. Presently it is functioning in the 3rd Floor of the G+7 storied Academy-cum-Library Building. It has world class infrastructure and facilities including electronic information system to meet the requirement of all students/researchers/faculty members of the Institute and enthusiasts from outside also.

Objectives:

- The main objective of the Division of Library & Information Services is to organize and to make the documents available to the users.
- To develop NIH Library & Information Centre, Kolkata into National Information Centre on Homoeopathy.

Activities of the Library

The Library & Information Services division provides the information system which is taken care of by efficient library staff. At present, there are more than 22000 books and 15 subscribed journals in the library. Institute has its own website, http://www.nih.nic.in developed in the year 2002. Current Awareness Services (CAS) and Flash (Internet information on homoeopathy world) are provided and partial automation has been achieved through WINISIS software. One archive for rare books, including some rare non-English (German, Spanish etc.) books, is available as reference books.

Selective Dissemination (SDI) service, a bi-monthly compilation of the contents of the current journals, subscribed by the Institute is published regularly. Reprography, binding, photography, A/V etc., are also provided. Five PG Departmental Libraries were set up with the help of the Central Library & Information Service Department. Presently all the UG departments also have Departmental Library.

INTRODUCTION

National Institute of Homoeopathy, an Autonomous Institution under the Ministry of AYUSH Govt. of India is having 100 bedded hospitals along with Medical College, there is also a Research Wing for research on Homoeopathy. It is a Post graduate Medical College and Hospital.

The Hospital is consisting of **Out Patient** and **In-patient** departments providing Healthcare services at the cost for registration fee of Rs. 5.00 per patient including medicine & nominal charges for different Pathological & Radiological investigations. Registration for outpatient department opens from 8.30 am till the last patient is served. Apart from general medicine, some specialized clinics are also involved with Healthcare service. A huge number patients from far flung areas of West Bengal even from outside of India visit here. Some of them from other States i.e. Assam, Tripura, Manipur, Nagaland, Bihar Orissa and from Bangladesh visit to get treatment through Homoeopathic systems of medicine. The hospital has investigation facilities viz. Clinical Pathology, Biochemistry, Radiology, Ultra-Sonography, Lung Function Test, TMT, GI Endoscopy, Echo Cardiograph and ECG etc. The Institute is providing Indoor patient care facilities through 100 bedded hospitals (presently shifted from Old Hospital Building to New Hospital Building and accommodate for 100 beds in which 80 beds are earmarked for Medical ward in which (Male Ward 36 Beds Including 4 Cabin & Female Ward 36 Beds including 4 Cabin) and 06 beds in Pediatrics Ward, 10 beds for Obs & Gyane and 4 beds for Surgical ward. As this is an academic institution, patients suffering from different chronic ailment are admitted for treatment as well as for clinical training of the Under-Graduate and Post-Graduate students. The bed strength of the Hospital will be enhanced to 250 beds in a phase wise manner in New Hospital Building. The Out-patients and In-patients Departments of the Institute provide medical care to the patients suffering from different chronic ailments. In the Financial year 2018-19 339940 (Three Lakhs Thirty Nine Thousand Nine Hundred Forty only) patients attended OPD at NIH, Salt Lake Complex, Kolkata.



HOSPITAL RECORD KEEPING:

A systematic data entry and record-keeping of all OPD & IPD patients and all data related to patients, systematically preserving from 2008-09 to till date are completed and entered in the database. There is a separate Medical Record keeping Division in new hospital building.

HOSPITAL KITCHEN & DIET:

At present raw materials are procured from suppliers and prescribed diet for the admitted patients are prepared by our own staff in the In- House- Kitchen of the Hospital. The dietitian monitus special requirements or make recommendations for the diet of the patients. Recently our dietitian has retired and one dietition is engaged in contract from February 2019. The hospital kitchen has been modernized to serve for 250 bedded hospital patients.

DISPENSARY:

The prescribed medicines by attending physicians from the OPD & IPD are dispensed from the in- House Dispensary of the hospital. Emphasis is given for dispensing of standard quality of Homoeopathy medicines to the patients. Necessary care has been taken, so that every patient's medicine is being dispensed accurately which is prescribed by physician. Adequate stock of medicine is maintained as per the approval of Institute's own Medicine Formulary Committee.

AMBULANCE SERVICE:

The hospital also provides Ambulance Service for transportation of the patients as and when required during emergency. Ambulance is available round the clock for which drivers accommodation is inside the campus for service.

4.3 OPERATION THEATRE

The Hospital is having well equipped, two modern Operation Theatres with apparatus/instruments, such as pulse-oxy meter, diathermy, portable ECG, X-ray and Microscope etc. Operation techniques are demonstrated to the students for training. But since

November 2016 OT is temporarily non-functioning. The Institute has a labour room and provides antenatal and post-natal care to the mother and child.



4.9 MEDICINAL HERB GARDEN

The herb garden at Kalyani, about 60 km away from Kolkata, was envisaged for building up of repository of authentic specimens of living herbs for research and academic purposes and acclimatization of exotic herbs in the fertile plains of gangetic alluvium in West Bengal, in order to develop import substitutes, for catering to the needs of local pharmaceutical industries as well as export oriented products. The garden, spread over in about 25 acres of land has grown and maintained 100 different species of medicinal plants, including 10 exotic species. Steps have been taken to develop its infrastructure.

1.5 Kilometer of road network in the garden have been developed with excavated earth from the existing water body in the garden and sprinkler irrigation system for 8 acres of land has been developed.

Medicinal crops Alfalfa, Aloes Vera, has registered a good yield.

Medicinal crops Linum usi tatissimum & Cuminum cyminum registered good yield demonstrating that wide range of commercial crops can be grown successfully at the garden.

One project proposal already been accepted by the National Medicinal Plant Board to cultivate, nurturing and utilizing some medicinal herbs in relation to establish Medicinal Plant's nursery for Institute.

For beautification of herbal garden one small flower garden adjacent to main entrance is well maintained. One peripheral OPD is running once in a week (Friday) in this Herb garden premises and more than 150 patients are attending for homeopathy treatment.

Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller & Auditor General of India on the Accounts of National Institute of Homoeopathy, Kolkata, for the year ended 31 March 2019

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of National Institute of Homoeopathy, Kolkata, as at 31 March 2019, the Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account, for the year ended on that date, under Section-20(1) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers and Conditions of Service) Act, 1971. The audit has been entrusted for the period upto the financial year 2022-23. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Institute's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only, with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms etc. Audit observations on financial transactions, in regard to compliance with the Laws, Rules & Regulations (i.e, Propriety and Regularity aspects) and efficiency-cum- performance aspects, etc, if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan arid perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by the management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
- 4. Based on our audit, we report that:
 - i) We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief, were necessary for the purpose of our audit;
 - ii) The Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account, dealt with in this report, have been drawn up in the format prescribed by the Ministry of Finance, Government of India.
 - iii) In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Institute, as required, insofar as it appears from our examination of books.
 - iv) We further report that

Comments on accounts

A. Balance Sheet:

1.1 Liabilities:

1.1.1 Capital Fund (Schedule-1): ₹115.25 crore

a) In violation of the terms of agreement made between the 'Ministry of AYUSH' and the Project Management Consultant (PMC), which state that any interest accruing on the project fund will be property of the Ministry, the Institute included accrued interest of ₹33.32 lakh earned on advances given to the PMC as 'Advances Recoverable on Capital Accounts'. This resulted in overstatement of 'Capital Fund' as well as 'Current Assets, Loans and Advances' (Schedule 11) by ₹33.32 lakh.

1.1.2 Earmarked/Endowment Fund (Schedule 3): ₹9.99 crore

The above head was overstated by ₹9.62 crore due to the following:

- a) The Institute included ₹.90 crore as receipt under the head 'Grant for Capital Expenditure', even though it was sanctioned by the Ministry of AYUSH only in May 2019. This resulted in overstatement of the 'Earmarked/ Endowment Fund' (Schedule-3) by ₹2.90 crore, as also the 'Current Assets, Loans, Advances' (Schedule 11) by the same amount.
- b) Despite mention in the last year's Separate Audit Report (SAR), the Institute again included

balances under the 'General Provident Fund' (₹6.18 crore) and 'Contributory Provident Fund' (₹0.54 crore) under 'Earmarked/Endowment Funds' (Schedule-3) in the main accounts. Consequently, balances under file 'Earmarked/Endowment Funds' (Schedule-3) were overstated by ₹6.72 crore and 'Current Assets, Loans, Advances' (Schedule 11) were also overstated by the same amount.

B. General Comment

- **2.1** Despite having been highlighted in the last financial year's SAR, the following issues remained unresolved in the current financial year also:
 - a) No provision was made for retirement benefits on actuarial basis, although this is prescribed in the Uniform format of Accounts.
 - b) The Institute charged depreciation at the written down value method, instead of the straight line method, although the latter method has been prescribed in the Uniform format of Accounts.

C. Grants-in-aid

During the financial year 2018-19, the grant sanctioned for and received by the Institute was ₹49.45 crore (Capital Grant: ₹22 crore and Revenue Grant: ₹27.45 crore). Out of the total grant off ₹49.45 crore, the Institute utilized ₹30.03 crore (Capital: ₹.15 crore and Revenue: ₹29.88 crore), leaving an unspent balance of ₹19.42 crore.

Further, during the financial year 2018-19, the Institute received a revenue grant of ₹5.00 lakh towards the Swachhata Action Plan (SAP), out of which, it made payment for ₹7.50 lakh, resulting in excess payment of ₹2.50 lakh.

D. Net Effect:

The net impact of the comments given in the preceding paragraphs was that the Assets and Liabilities sides, of the Institute's Balance Sheet, as on 31-03-2019, were overstated by ₹9.95 crore.

E. Management Letter

Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Director, National Institute of Homoeopathy, Kolkata, through a Management letter, issued separately, for remedial/corrective action.

- v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account, dealt with in this report, are in agreement with the books of accounts.
- vi. In our opinion, and to the best of our information, and according to the explanations given to us, the said financial statements, read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in the Annexure to this Audit Report, give a true and fair view, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India:
 - a) Insofar as it relates to the Balance Sheet, of the state of affairs of the National Institute of Homoeopathy, Kolkata, as at 31 March 2019 and
 - b) Insofar as it relates to Income and Expenditure Account of the deficit, for the year ended on that date.

Annexure

A. Adequacy of Internal Audit System

The Internal Audit System of the Institute is inadequate on account of the following:

- i. It does not have its own internal audit manual.
- ii. No internal audit has been conducted since the financial year 2015-16.
- **iii.** While it has outsourced the preparation of its annual accounts to a CA firm, it has not engaged any internal auditor for internal audit.
- iv. It does not have an internal audit department.

B. Adequacy of Internal Control System

The Internal Control System is inadequate on account of the following:

- i. There is no system of internal management reporting.
- **ii.** There is no plan in place for rotation of duties of employees dealing with cash, stocks and other valuables.
- iii. The cancelled cheques are not being mutilated by the Institute.
- iv. The Institute is not preparing detailed records of receipts.
- v. It is not in the practice of issuing serially numbered receipts to representatives collecting revenues in cash.

C. System of Physical verification of Fixed Assets/Inventory

- i. The gross value of 'Fixed Assets' was shown as ₹77.70 crore in the annual accounts of the Institute, for the financial year 2018-19. The 'Asset Register', maintained in the Institute, however, exhibited the value of land & buildings as ₹24.53 crore. The Institute may reconcile the discrepancy of ₹53.17 crore.
- ii. The Institute had last conducted the physical verification of its Assets (other than inventories) in the financial year 2014-15.

D. Statutory Liabilities:-

The Institute was regular in payment of its Statutory Dues.





SCHEDULE 24-SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Principal activities of the Institute are to impart education, provide health care facilities and promoting research activities in Homoeopathy.

1. ACCOUNTING CONVENTION

- (I) The financial statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention, unless otherwise stated and on the accrual method of accounting.
- (ii) Government Grants, against which sanction orders are issued within 31st March are taken into account as income for that financial year, on accrual basis.
- (iii) The Institute's accounts reflect the utilisation of the grants received/receivable from the Government of India and other related incomes received/accrued up to 31st March. Therefore, liabilities, though known and admissible, are provided for in the accounts.
- (iv) All other known incomes, if accrued within 31st March, whether received or not, are taken into account on accrual basis.
- (v) Liabilities for expenses over Rs.1000/- to the extent known, up to a cut-off date 31st May, 2018 and admissible are accounted for. Similarly, payments in advance for subsequent accounting period are accounted for as advance/pre-paid expenses.

2. FIXED ASSETS

For any expenditure incurred for creation of Capital Asset utilizing Grant received for the purpose and for purchase of other assets the Corpus/Capital Fund Account is credited by capitalizing from the Earmarked Fund for Capital Grant and GIA General Grants received (the balance available grant is utilized for revenue expenditure). When the Assets are sold/condemned or otherwise disposed off, the respective asset account is credited by the written down book value of the asset and the difference between written down value and net realized value is exhibited as profit/loss on disposal of obsolete assets and credited/debited to income and expenditure account respectively.

Assets are shown at gross value less accumulated depreciation provided in the accounts upto the end of the year.

3. DEPRECIATION

Depreciation on assets has been calculated on the provisional method on the written down value of the assets at the prevailing rates of depreciation specified in the Income Tax Act, 1961 as amended from time to time. The depreciation has been provided in the books on additions to the assets and put to use during the year for a period of less than 180 days in the financial year is provided at 50% of the prescribed rates. The total depreciation calculated on all depreciable assets during the year, is provided for by charging the Income and Expenditure Account. An amount equal to the amount of depreciation provided on assets created out of Government Grant has been withdrawn from Capital / Corpus Fund and credited to Income & Expenditure Account as per the provisions of Accounting Staandard-12.

4. FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS

Transactions denominated in foreign currency are accounted in INR (Indian Rupee) at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of transaction. No expenditure in foreign currency has been incurred by the Institute during the current and previous year.

5. RETIREMENT BENEFITS

No liability towards gratuity payable on death / retirement / termination of employees including leave encashment benefit is provided on actuarial basis in the accounts. All such retirement benefits are recorded on the basis of actual payment.

6. <u>SET OFF</u>

Advances to staff and third parties are set off against the corresponding liabilities by charging the relevant expenditure, to the extent linked.

7. INVESTMENT

The Institute has no Investment other than Term Deposits in the Nationalised Banks. As per Memorandum of Association, Rules and Regulations and Bye Laws of the Institute, the Institute's entire investment are made with Nationalised Bank in Short Term Bank deposits.

8. <u>INVENTORY VALUATION</u>

Medicines and consumables purchased by the Institute has duly been recorded and maintained by dispensary and store. Quantitative details are available with respective department. The value of stock as at the year end has not been incorporated in the books.

2 Capital Commitments

- a) i) During the year Rs.747.96 lakh has been paid to NPCCL for 2nd Phase construction work at NIH, Kolkata in addition to Mobilisation Advance of Rs.278.00 lakh paid in last year. Interest of Rs.2.65 lakh has been declared by NPCCL on the fund paid to them. Institute credited the said interest in Capital fund as per Govt of India guidelines. The Agency incurred an expenditure of Rs.841.00 lakh against total cost of the project of Rs.3708.39 lakh as per contract for the 2nd Phase development.
 - ii) Utilisation certificates of NPCCL is still pending for adjustement of old advacne of Rs.715.45 remain outstanding as on 31-03-2019.
- b) Project Magnagement Consultancy Fee of Rs.196.37 lakh and as Project Fund an amount of Rs. 4099.29 lakh has been paid during the year to MECON Limited for construction work of NIH Narela. PMC Fee of Rs.62.07 lakh was paid in 2017-18. MECON Ltd has declared interest of Rs.33.32 lakh has been earned upto 19th March, 2019 on the total fund of Rs.6598.43 lakh paid to them and the interest amount has been credited to Capital Fund. Out of total fund released Rs. 4357.73 lakh has been paid by NIH as per approval of Ministry of AYUSH and Rs.2240.70 lakh released in 2017 by the Ministry as stated in the Consolidated Statement of Project Fund Utilisation of the MECON.
- The Institute during the accounting year 2018-19 received Rs.1550.00 lakh, Rs.1200.00 lakhs towards Grant in Aid General and Rs. 2490.00 lakh as Grant for Capital Expenditure. However Rs.290.00 lakh of Grant for Capital Expenditure has been received in April, 2019. The grants, as per accounts, have been utilised as follows:

- 5. The Institute maintained current account with Flexi Fixed Deposit facility. Under this system bank transfer the available fund in excess of Rs.2.50 lakh to a flexible fixed deposit account, earning interest. The bank automatically transfer the required money out of flexi fixed deposit account on presentation of cheque before the bank in excess of Rs.2.50 lakh to make up the shortfall, if any, and keeping a balance of Rs.2.50 lakh in the current account at the end of the day. The balance of flexi fixed deposit account included in the Deposit Account balance of the Institute.
- 6. Separate books of accounts are maintained for Endowment / Earmarked Fund (GPF, CPF, Pension) except Earmarked Fund for Grant for Capital Expenditure, Pharmaco-Vigilance and CME Programme. Seperate bank accounts were opended in December, 2018 for all three Earmarked Fund and institute decided to maintain seperate books of accounts from the coming year. The closing balances of all the funds represent bank balances and grants receivable from Central Government. Receipts and payments of the Sub Funds, books of accounts of which are maintained separately, for the year incorporated in the General Fund Book. The fund utilised out of Fund for Grant for Capital Expenditure during the year transferred to Capital/Corpus Fund leaving the unutilised amount as balance of the Fund.
- 7. The Ministry of AYUSH vide their letter No.G.25020/6/2018/NI has made it mandatory to submit the interest earned in previous year on all type of GIA to Consolidated Fund of India. Accordingly the interest earned of Rs.99.68 lakh on grants received from Ministry during the year kept in seperate account in the Balance Sheet. Interest credited by NPCCL and Mecon Ltd as reffered above has been credited to Capital Fund.
- 8. In the opinion of the Management, the current assets, loans and advances have a value on realisation in the ordinary course of business, equal at least to the aggregate amount shown in the Balance Sheet.
- 9. Taxation:The Institute is exempted from payment of Income Tax u/s 10(23C) (iiiac) of Income Tax Act, 1961.
- 10. The corresponding figures for the previous year have been regrouped / rearranged, wherever necessary.
- 11. Schedules 1 to 25 are annexed to and form an integral part of the Balance Sheet as at 31st March, 2019 and the Income & Expenditure Account for the year ended on that date.
